Programme-specific section:

Master's Programme: North American Studies

These Course and Examination Regulations (henceforth OER) have been drawn up in accordance with the Higher Education and Research Act [*Wet op het hoger onderwijs en wetenschappelijk onderzoek*; WHW] (henceforth the Act) and the following Leiden University regulations:

- the Leiden Register of Study Programmes Framework Document;
- the Academic Calendar;
- the Regulations for Student Registration;
- the Regulations for Admission to Master's Programmes.

Pursuant to Article 7.14 of the Act, the Faculty Board regularly evaluates the Course and Examination Regulations and considers, for the purpose of monitoring and adjusting the study load, how much time it takes students to comply with them. In accordance with Article 9.18 of the Act, the departmental committee is assigned the task of annually assessing the implementation of the OER.

These Course and Examination Regulations consist of two sections: a faculty section that is the same for all programmes and a section that contains information that is specific to a particular programme, what is known as the programme-specific section of the Course and Examination Regulations. In the text below the relevant articles will refer to this section.

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Chapter 2 Description of the Programme

Article 2.1 Objectives of the programme

The programme has the following objectives:

1. to enable students to acquire academic knowledge, understanding and skills, and train them in the use of scientific methods in the field of American Studies;
2. to enable students to develop the following academic and professional skills:
 - independent academic reasoning and conduct,
 - the ability to analyse complex problems,
 - academic reporting;
3. to prepare students for an academic career and further education;
4. to prepare students for a career outside academia.

Article 2.2 Specialisations

Article 2.3 Learning outcomes

Graduates of the programme have attained the following learning outcomes, listed according to the Dublin descriptors:

1. *Knowledge and understanding*

- a. comprehensive knowledge and understanding of major issues in the history, politics, literature, and culture of the United States, with a focus on themes like emancipation struggles, global interactions, U.S. exceptionalism, and cultural identities, as well as the main scholarly and theoretical debates on these issues;

2. *Applications of knowledge and understanding*

- a. the ability to critically analyse American historical and literary texts and place them in their cultural and historical context;
- b. the ability to conduct independent research in the area of North American Studies, thereby showing the ability to comprehend and apply relevant theoretical insights and multidisciplinary methodological approaches;
- c. the ability to identify and collect primary and secondary sources in the area of North American Studies in conventional and digital archives;
- d. the ability to apply knowledge of North American history, literature and culture to contemporary developments;
- e. the ability to apply the acquired skills of analysis, research and communication in the area of North American Studies to other fields and professional contexts in which academic training at master's level is necessary or useful;

3. *Judgment*

- a. the ability to critically assess and utilise primary and secondary sources to construct an extended argument in the form of a master's thesis in the area of North American Studies;
- b. the ability to judge the relative merits of academic opinions and arguments on contemporary developments in North American Studies;

4. *Communication*

- a. the ability to orally present and defend in academic English of a high standard the result of individual and group research;
- b. the ability to effectively communicate research results in academic English of a high standard in various formats, such as book reviews, online forums, essays and a master's thesis;

5. *Learning skills*

- a. the learning abilities required to be able to follow post-master's professional training or a PhD training of a largely self-determined or autonomous nature.

Article 2.5 **Study load**

The programme has a study load of 60 credits.

Article 2.8 **Language of instruction**

In compliance with the Code of Conduct regarding Language of Instruction¹ the language of instruction and examination of the programme is English. Students are expected to have an adequate command of the language of instruction of the programme.

Chapter 3 **Curriculum**

5.2.3 As further clarification of Article 2.8 concerning the student's command of the language of instruction, the language requirement for this master's programme is

- English IELTS 7.0, TOEFL 100 (internet-based) or Cambridge English: Proficiency (CPE);
- for the 'speaking' and 'writing' components a minimum score of IELTS 7.0 or TOEFL 25 is required.

The Faculty Board may request that applicants demonstrate an adequate command at this level. 5.2.4 Pursuant to Article 7.30b (1) of the Act persons will be granted admission to the programme, if they can demonstrate to the satisfaction of the Faculty Board that they meet the following admission requirements:

- A bachelor's degree from a research university, equivalent to the level of a Dutch academic Bachelor's degree, or demonstrate to meet the requirements for such a degree, including the General Academic Skills listed in Appendix B, and
- possess knowledge and understanding of the defining events and developments in the history and culture of the United States and/or knowledge and understanding of the canonical works of American literature; applicants should, for example, have a Bachelor's degree in the field of American Studies or another Bachelor's degree in Humanities or Social Sciences that includes components in the field of American Studies worth at least 30 credits;

Applicants who have a Bachelor's degree in Humanities or Social Sciences and who have completed the minor in American Studies at Leiden University are considered to have fulfilled this requirement.

Applicants with a Bachelor's degree in International Studies from Leiden University who

- have completed all area courses for North America, and
- wrote their BA Thesis on North America and/or completed at least one optional course worth 10 credits which is included in the premaster program in American Studies (as specified in article 5.4)

are considered to have fulfilled all of the requirements mentioned above.
